From the President: Winter Safety



As we enter the colder fall months in Wisconsin, with winter definitely on its way, home inspectors should think seriously about cold weather safety.

Are you geared up for cold weather? Gloves, hats, face masks, long underwear, electric mitten heaters, whatever works – it's time to remember where you put the warm stuff.

Wisconsin inspectors are exposed to brutal weather conditions, and frost bite is a real and common winter danger on the job. At times we might be outside for up to an hour at temperatures well below freezing. Dressing for the weather also helps us do our jobs well. I never want to be tempted to skimp on the exterior portion because I'm freezing my butt off!

While I always think about safety when placing a ladder in summer, it's even more important in winter. The ground may be hard, or frozen, or icy – be careful not to climb a ladder that may slide out from under you. Icy gutters are just as hazardous, because ladders can slide sideways, too. And although I want my customers to know as much as possible about the house, if the roof is covered with frost, ice, or snow, walking that roof is not a risk I am willing to take.

And it's not just our own safety we should think about. We should also consider our client's safety. When they schedule their inspections, do we remind them to dress appropriately for the weather? To me this is important for good customer service and my own self-interest, because a client who is outside with me will not only have a greater understanding of the home, but also of the inherent difficulties and limitations of inspecting in a Wisconsin winter.

As a follow up, we have been informed by Swandby/Kilgore Associates that the cleanup bill on a number of regulated professions has been introduced in each house of state government. The bill includes language that will affect continuing education credits and renewal of licensing for home inspection in Wisconsin. Your board is keeping a close eye on the proposed changes and will keep all members informed of the outcome.

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How does a 10-year-old masonry chimney that was built as an addition onto a house, start to lean above the roof line when only a pre-fabricated fireplace vents up it?

Great question! I just had one like this. Put my level on the chimney and it was two inches out of plumb in 6' above the roof line. My personal opinion is that the chimney was built wrong. It's basically a three-sided chimney below the roof line and a four-sided chimney above the roof line. (Masonry fireplace facades are almost never load supporting; just for looks.) The chimney is on an outside wall, is 6' wide, has two 24" side walls below roof line, is 6' wide and has 36" side walls above roof line. Its cantilevered fourth side stuck out too far. It had all the earmarks of having the fourth side and parts of the two shorter sides above the roof line being held up by roof joists or wall studs that shrink over time (as pretty much all construction wood will). When I called for a structural engineer to come out because there was a vaulted ceiling (no attic), the engineering company said everything was fine. I still believe I'm right, but when an engineer makes that conclusion there's not much else to say. I apologize but I have no idea why a 10-year-old masonry chimney, on a 10-year-old addition, would lean otherwise. I do know that I have had this be the case in dozens of other chimneys I've come across. Often you can crawl into the attic and see this is exactly the case.



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Ghosting: Not That Scary

What do poltergeists, Casper, and carbon and particle sources have in common? They all produce a form of ghosting. Which is more troubling? Considering that poltergeists and Casper the friendly ghost probably don't exist, ghosting by carbon and particle sources wins.

Cause of Ghosting

Ghosting is the term for the buildup of particles on surfaces. In most residential situations, the particles are carbon being released from combustion sources. Grinding and other activities that produce high levels of micro-sized particles may also result in ghosting. Typically, ghosting appears on cooler portions of exterior walls and ceilings as shown in the picture of a living room that is presented. The carbon is typically created from the burning of candles and incense, back drafting of gas-fired water heaters and furnaces, and rarely from improperly combusting gas-fired fireplaces and ovens, idling of vehicles in attached garages, and oil lamps.

Ghosting of particles on cool surfaces is the result of the particles losing energy. All particles have varying levels of kinetic energy that make them vibrate. The hotter a particle is, the more it can vibrate. A particle with a lot of kinetic energy will hit a wall and bounce off. However, particles bouncing into cold walls and ceilings lose their energy, experience less vibration, and stick to the surface. Ghosting doesn't just occur on cold surfaces, however.

Ghosting is also commonly observed on plastics, electronics, and in carpeting. The particles stick to plastics and electronics because of static charges. Air movement through floors can result in particle buildup in the carpeting. Typically, the particle deposition

in carpet will be seen at doors, the edges of the carpeting at walls, and in the outline of the 4x8 sheets of the subfloor. Most inspectors likely see darkening of carpeting at walls several times each month.

Occasionally, ghosting is observed on walls above both forced-air registers and water/electric registers, such as in the picture presented. In those situations, the increased air movement over the wall surfaces simply allows more particles to go past and stick to the wall. For the water/electrical registers, the heated air rises above the registers, causing the increased air movement over the wall.

Addressing Ghosting

The first step in addressing any problem is, of course, identifying and eliminating the cause. If a home inspector observes ghosting, the inspector may want to carefully observe the functionality of any gas-fired appliance. Idling of vehicles in attached garages can also sometime be the culprit. If a current source is not identified, assume the previous occupants were burning candles, especially jar candles.

After the source has been presumably identified and eliminated, the entire residence and forced-air system must be thoroughly cleaned. The carbon and particles are actually all over in the dust, not just where the ghosting is occurring. Carpeting should be professionally cleaned with a wet extraction process and forced dry. If the ghosting is severe, the carpeting and pad will likely release enough of the particles for the ghosting to recur, usually during the next winter. At Environmental Initiatives, we warn clients that the ghosting may recur due to the carpets. We then instruct the client to clean and paint only a minor portion of the wall where ghosting occurred. If ghosting does not recur

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the following winter, then the carpeting can be kept and the walls and ceilings painted. If the ghosting recurs, it's time to invest in new carpeting and pad.

Health Effects

The release of the particles and carbon likely do not impact the health of occupants, even environmentally-sensitive occupants. However, other chemicals co-releasing with the carbon from combustion appliances can impact occupant health. Besides the well-known effects of carbon monoxide, other irritant gases are also produced.

Suggested Report Wording

The following is suggested report wording for when ghosting is observed:

“Dark staining was observed in <insert locations>. The staining appeared to be from carbon or particle buildup. The carbon is typically released by the burning of candles or incense. Occasionally, the carbon is released from a gas-fired appliance,

such as a furnace, water heater, or stove. The staining itself is cosmetic. Based on site observations, the likely source of the carbon is <insert candle burning if combustion appliance appears normal, or note combustion issues>. If the ghosting is affecting the carpeting or if the walls are extensively discolored, then the carpeting will be releasing carbon and causing additional ghosting on walls and ceilings for several years and may require replacement. The surfaces affected can be cleaned and painted. The discoloration may return if the residence and any forced-air HVAC systems are not thoroughly cleaned and the source of carbon or particles not addressed.”

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

Education House – Inspection Review and Training

Friday, December 6th, 2013

This on-site inspection event is comprised of two parts – an inspection *review* in the morning, followed by inspection *training* in the afternoon. WAHI has obtained the use of a home in the Oconomowoc area for this program.

Inspection Review

This peer review event is an opportunity for you to evaluate and refine your inspection skills with the aid of a panel of your peers, rather than a person in a black robe with a big “hammer” (i.e. gavel). Results will be kept strictly confidential.

Participants will have two-hours to complete their inspection (electrical panels will already be removed, ladders in place, cover off the furnace, etc., to aid in the time limit). Upon completion participants will present their findings and their completed report to the panel as if to a client – the panel have inspected the house and identified defects.

Participants are asked to bring two recently completed inspection reports for review by the panel to see if they are meeting state standards. There will be “must find, must report” items that the panel will be looking for. The panel will be focusing on the identification of major defects, not issues such as windows or doors sticking. During the inspection process communication between participants will not be allowed as this event is intended to help participants evaluate their personal skill level. The morning session will be worth **three continuing education credits** and is limited to the first 10 registrants.

Inspection Training

The afternoon session will be inspection training at the same property. Experienced experts will be posted throughout the house in numerous locations to provide approximately 45-minute presentations on how to inspect various components, focusing on the WI Standards of Practice. Participants will then rotate to the next area/presenter. The training will take place from 1:00 pm to 5:00 pm and will be worth **four continuing education credits**. The afternoon portion will be limited to the first 40 registrants.
